Patient-Physician Relationships and Racial Disparities in the Quality of Health Care

The authors used data from The Commonwealth Fund's 2001 Health Care Quality Survey to explore the role of patient-physician relationships in understanding disparities in the quality of healthcare. Patient reports of the quality of patient-physician communication, physicians' cultural sensitivity, and patient-physician racial concordance were analyzed in 1,037 African-American, 1,153 Hispanic, 621 Asian, and 3,488 white respondents.

Racial and ethnic differences in ratings of patient-physician communication were found. These differences were largely accounted for by racial/ethnic differences in patients' health literacy and in their perceptions of physicians' cultural sensitivity.

Satisfaction with and use of health services were higher for Blacks and Whites than for Hispanics and Asians. Racial differences in the quality of patient-physician communication helped explain disparities in satisfaction but not in health services use.

The authors concluded that efforts to improve cross-cultural patient physician interactions should be aimed at increasing patients' health literacy and physicians' cultural sensitivity and interpersonal skills.
